

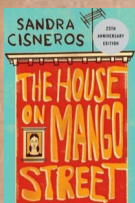

by Sandra Cisneros**

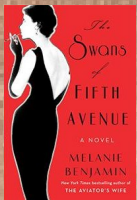
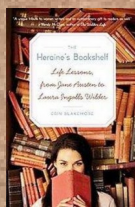

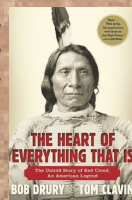
***The Swan of Fifth Avenue*

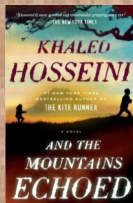

by Khaled Hosseini

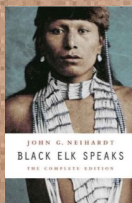

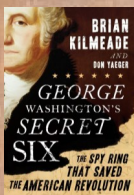

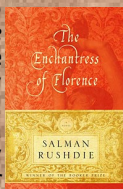
George Washington's Secret Six
